

The Talking Book

The Talking Book is an online interactive book, which focuses on the people, places, and events that shaped the City of Coral Gables in its early history.

The project has two parts. The first is a narrative telling the story of the City's history. The second is a database of photographs, texts, and ephemera related to the City.

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There is no way to quantify how many individuals have come to South Florida looking for a fresh start, but no doubt that such promise has always been part of the area's appeal. In 1898, shortly after Henry Flagler extended his railroad southward from Palm Beach and the City of Miami was born, Solomon Merrick, a Congregationalist minister at the Old Plymouth Church in Duxbury, Massachusetts, sat in his snowbound Cape Cod home mourning the loss of his young daughter Ruth to pneumonia. The streets outside were veritable canyons of ice, and Ruth was among 40 residents who succumbed to the disease in the past week. So many had died and the weather was so bad that many victims lay still unburied.

When an old friend came to pay his respects and mentioned to the elder Merrick that he had just returned from Florida, a place which he described in terms that would make Marco Polo's tales seem tame, Merrick had heard enough. He and his wife Althea both suffered from Quinsy, a chronic form of rheumatism exacerbated by the harsh New England climate, and they had five other young children — how

many more might they lose in the frigid winters

Solomon Merrick made inquiries and learned that a quarter section (160 acres) of farmland some five miles southwest of the 500-person


The talking book provided an opportunity to make these materials available in a way that delivers context for the user, and allowing them to venture on an information discovery path.

MINUTES OF THE FIRST MEETING OF THE CITY COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF CORAL GABLES - May 1st, 1925.

The city commissioners of the city of coral cables, met pursuant to the provisions of the Municipal Charter, incorporating said city, at the Administration Building, in the city of coral cables, Florida, which was temporarily designated as the city hall. Said meeting was held at 12 o'clock noon, the 1st day of may, A. D. 1925.

All of the members of the City Commission were present.

George E. Merrick Edward E. Dammers Telfair Knight C. F. Baldwin F. W. Webster

Mr. George E. Merrick was nominated and unanimously elected as Temporary Chairman of the meeting. Mr. Edwin G. Bishop was requested to perform the duties of Clerk.

The chairman announced that the first business to come before the meeting was the election of a Mayor for the new City of Coral Gables. And thereupon with due formality and in compliance with the provisions of the said City Charter, Dr. Edward E. Dammers was nominated as Mayor of the city of Coral Gables, Florida. Upon motion duly made and unanimously carried, it was moved that the nominations be closed and the clerk passed the unanimous ballot of the City Commissioners for Dr. Edward E. Dammers as Mayor. This having been duly accomplished, Mr. Merrick resigned the Chair to Dr. Edward E. Dammers, who assumed the duties of Mayor.

The Mayor thereupon announced that it was now in order to formally accept the City Charter incorporating the City of Coral Gables. Mr. Sishop, as clerk, was thereupon directed to read same for the information of the Commissioners. This having been done, said City Charter was duly accepted and adopted as a City Charter for said City of Coral Gables

- transparency can be adjusted to see changes take place over time




